COACH "IRISH" GARRITY

A graduate of West Virginia Wesleyan, where he received national recognition on the All-American football team, Edward F. Garrity came to Hinton High School ten years ago; and since then from the meager material of Summers County he has built smart, strong, successful teams that have rivaled any elevens in the State. When the Bobcats defeated the famed Huntington Pony Express in 1935, his genius and ability received deserved state-wide recognition and as a result he was appointed by popular vote head coach of the South squad in the annual North-South Football Classics—the highest honor bestowed on a high school coach.

To us, the squad, he was a driving power of skillful knowledge that would know only success—a friend among friends who appreciated his personality with its rare humor—a pal in all the ways that only real pals can know—Coach "Irish" Garrity.
