SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

Station H. H. S. broadcasting from Hinton, West Virginia, The Dart '36 announcing: The Senior Class of '36 will give a program in four parts representing a year each. The first is their Freshman year with Adam Criddle, President, speaking: Mr. Criddle:

"It was in the fall of 1932 that the illustrious Class of '36 entered the doors of Hinton High School. We were, like all other freshmen who had gone before us, new to the routines of the school. After about a week spent in finding our classes and in settling down to real studying, the Freshmen called a meeting to elect our class officers. The following officers were duly elected:

"In our Sophomore year we had several candy and pie sales. We made enough money to give the Seniors a party at the Manhattan Hall. The Seniors were very grateful to us for entertaining them.

"While we were Sophomores, we had several parties at the Fox Hall."
