William Edward "Bill" Dressler

Bill Dressler was born May 27, 1914 in Hinton, he was the son of the late Charles James and Lottie Lillian Briers Dressler.

A lifelong resident of Hinton, he graduated from Hinton High School in 1934 along with his soon to become wife, Virginia Clotille Harford. Together they raised Dr. William Conrad Dressler, Kloris Ann Dressler McCormick and Jean Karen Dressler Beasley, all of whom were Valedictorians in their Classes at Hinton High School.

Bill served his country in the United States Army during WWII. On his return from active duty, he resumed his job as clerk for the C&O Railway Company. He retired as chief clerk for the C & O Railway Company, Hinton Division in 1974. He supported and was very active in the community, a member of the B.R.A.C. (Brotherhood of Railway Clerks), the Hinton Kiwanis Club, and the Riverview Chapel in Hinton. He also served as past president of the Summers County Senior Citizens and Summers County Historical Society.

Bill served as Mayor of Hinton from 1971 – 1973, and as City Councilman for ten years. During his tenure as city councilman and mayor, Bill entered notes in small spiral-bound pads which are archived in his family's possession. It has been said by his son-in-law, Jerry Beasley that, "Those pads are brimming with details about city government, probably enough to earn a PHD in political science and surely enough to inspire deep gratitude for those good people who serve us locally."
